

MAGNUS

At age 13, a shy Norwegian boy made a decision: One day he would become the World Chess Champion.

The documentary MAGNUS is the personal journey of Magnus Carlsen — now 25 years old — who is known as "the Mozart of Chess". Shot over a decade, the filmmakers take you inside the mind of a modern genius, from boyhood to the culmination of his quest for the game's highest honor. From an awkward childhood to international renown, the movie tells a coming of age story that is bound to engage non-chess players as well as the millions of people who play chess all over the world.

SYNOPSIS

As a young boy Magnus Carlsen was very different from his peers. He usually sat by himself, lost in thought, and his parents, Henrik and Sigrun, were concerned about his relative development. When a strong interest in numbers made them realize that he could become a good chess player, they introduced him to the game at the tender age of 5. He soon started climbing the ranks of the chess world.

At 13 he became the youngest grandmaster in the world, and began to wonder just how far he could go. Magnus' father was told that the road to success in chess is paved with hard discipline and structure, but he refused to force Magnus into rigid modes of learning. Instead the family let him keep his playfulness, and nurtured his curiosity and fascination for the game. This approach, in time, strengthens Magnus' best overall trait as a chess player: His brilliant intuition.

Joining Magnus in his youth, we witness how chess complicates his life in other arenas, and at home he experiences increasing social challenges. He attends a new school where he is bullied by kids who don't appreciate or understand what his mind can do. Lonely and a bit alienated, Magnus relies on his family to support him as he charts an unusual path to greatness.

At the age of 13 Magnus gets a chance to match wits against the Russian chess legend Garry Kasparov, the world's best player, and World Champion for 15 years. Magnus attracts global attention by holding the champion to a draw. Not long after this fateful game Magnus declares his own personal ambition to challenge for the chess crown. But like all great challenges in life, it's easier said than done.





We rejoin Magnus 10 years later as he takes part in the qualifying tournament for the World Chess Championship title bout. After losing a crucial game late in the tournament, Magnus is shaken up by the realization that his intuition is not fully working. Under extreme pressure to live up to his own — and the world's — expectations, he isolates himself, fighting his inner demons, and avoids talking to others about his problems. And yet with a little luck he narrowly wins the competition to earn a place in the World Championship match — a chance to finally fulfill his childhood dream.

A few months later, Magnus is getting ready for the title fight. His opponent, the five-time World Champion Viswanathan Anand from India, uses the best computer engines in the world to help him prepare for chess games. Magnus by contrast tries to avoid computers as much as possible and think for himself.

Tens of millions of people are following the World Championship match, set in Chennai, India — Anand's hometown.

During the first few games of the 12-game match, the champion has full control, and 22-year-old Magnus has trouble coping with the huge pressure. Anand is over 20 years his senior and a veteran of multiple World Championships since he first challenged Kasparov for the title before Magnus had even learned how the pieces move!

After the fourth game Magnus meets his family on a rest day. They play cards and sing along with familiar Norwegian songs. The next day, newly relaxed, Magnus shows the chess world what he can do above all: Produce creative chess like no one has seen before. Magnus wins the championship (becoming just the 16th undisputed champion in history) as well as the highest ranked player of all time.

MAGNUS is the story of a precocious boy who conquers the world. A unique insight in a master's mind as he charts a path to greatness.

Benjamin Ree is a Norwegian documentary filmmaker. He studied journalism at the University College in Oslo and moved on to work as a journalist for Reuters and freelancing for BBC. A few years later he started making award winning short documentaries, which premiered at the International Documentary Film Festival in Amsterdam and the Chicago International Children's Film Festival. Today he works as a documentary director at VGTV.

MAGNUS is a portrait of the world's best chess player Magnus Carlsen, and is Ree's first feature length documentary.

During the last 15 years Magnus Carlsen has become the highest ranked player of all time.

I found it immensely fascinating that no one I talked to understood how Magnus Carlsen had become so good – not even himself! He has studied the game in a completely different way than all the greatest chess players in history. He has been driven by playfulness and curiosity, rather than discipline and structure. I wanted to understand how Magnus' brain works and find out who he really is on a deeper human level» - Benjamin Ree, director.

ABOUT THE SCREENWRITER



Linn-Jeanethe Kyed is a Norwegian screenwriter. She graduated from The Norwegian Film School in 2010. Her graduating project, the short film *Tuba Atlantic* (Hallvar Witsø, 2010), won a gold medal award at the 38th Annual Student Academy Awards 2011, *Tuba Atlantic* was also nominated for «Best Short Film, Live Action» at the Academy Awards 2012. In 2014, Kyed had her feature debut through the action-comedy *Børning* (Hallvard Bræin, 2014). The movie obtained great national attention, becoming the most visited cinema movie in 2014 and winning four Norwegian National Film Awards (Amanda).

ABOUT THE PRODUCER



Sigurd Mikal Karoliussen graduated from The Norwegian Film School in 2000 with a producing degree. He has worked both as a lineproducer and release coordinator of such films as *Elling* (Petter Næss, 2001), which got an Academy Award nomination for Best Foreign Language Film, *Buddy* (Morten Tyldum, 2003) and *Uno* (Aksel Hennie, 2004) among others. From 2007 until 2010 he was commissioning editor at Nordic Film & TV Fund for feature films and TV-series. In 2012 he produced his first feature film *The Journey to the Christmas Star* (Nils Gaup, 2012). The film has been sold to over 117 countries and achieved a cinema audience of almost one million people to date. Today Sigurd Mikal is a producer at Nordisk Film Production: *MAGNUS* is a co-production between Moskus Film, VGTV, Main Island Production and Nordisk Film.
